

**Education Estimating Conference
On Student Financial Aid
EXECUTIVE SUMMARY
February 24, 2012**

The Student Financial Aid (SFA) Estimating Conference met on February 24, 2012 to adopt updated student financial aid program estimates for FY 2011-12 and FY 2012-13.

The Conference adopted updated Bright Futures estimates for FY 2011-12 and FY 2012-13, and approved long-run estimates using the adopted FY 2012-13 levels with a cohort-survival model. In brief, the FY 2011-12 estimate for total awards was reduced from 179,690 to 173,887 (a reduction of 5,803 awards or about 3.2%). The FY 2012-13 estimate for total awards was reduced from 176,212 to 170,808 (a reduction of 5,404 awards or about 3.1%). Details can be found on the Bright Futures Consensus Estimate Summary.

Details of the FY 11-12 and FY 2012-13 estimates adopted for the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant (FRAG) program, the Access to Better Learning and Education (ABLE) program, the various Florida Student Assistance Grant (FSAG) programs and the Children and Spouses of Deceased or Disabled Veterans (CSDDV) program are shown on the Consensus Programs Summary. For FY 2011-12, student counts for these programs decreased by 84,032. For FY 2012-13 student counts decreased by 20,386.

The principals requested that the Office of Student Financial Aid provide student counts from FY 2007-2008 forward for the FRAG program as well as a break out of the disbursed students at FSU and UF for the CSDDV program.

Continuing Impacts of Recent Law Changes

2010 Law Changes, HB 5201

1. REDUCTION IN COURSE HOURS COVERED BY AWARD

Bright Futures covered 120% of hours needed to graduate prior to FY 2010-11.

Change to 100% covered begins with FALL 2010 INITIALS (FY 10-11).

Assuming students take 30 hours each year, first effects would not be felt until FY 14-15.

There may be an IMPACT in the final forecast period (through FY 14-15); however, this has not been explicitly modeled.

2. ALLOW CONTINUATION OF UNUSED AWARD THROUGH GRADUATE SCHOOL

This provision is effective in FY 2010-11 for those students completing the baccalaureate in seven semesters or less.

Depending upon student behavior, this provision may counterbalance to some extent the reduction

in course hours covered. In the short term, it may increase the cost of Bright Futures slightly.

The effect is indeterminate, however, because student behavior changes in response to this

new opportunity is unknown.

In FY 2010-11, about 130 students took advantage of this new provision.

3. REDUCTION IN LENGTH OF TIME AWARD MAY BE UTILIZED

Bright Futures could be used for up to seven years after graduation for most students before FY 2011-12.

Change in award length to FIVE YEARS begins with FALL 2011 INITIALS (FY 11-12).

Because of the grandfathering of currently-enrolled students, the first effects of this

change in length of time the award may be utilized will not be felt until FY 15-16.

There may be an IMPACT in the final forecast period (through FY 14-15); however, this has not been explicitly modeled.

4. INCREASE IN SAT/ACT ELIGIBILITY SCORES

IF STUDENT SCORES DO NOT INCREASE, eligible pool will shrink and cost will decrease.

Change in eligibility scores begins with FALL 2012 INITIALS (FY 12-13), and will continue through the forecast period.

Students may elect to use the GSV route, which requires lower test scores, to obtain at least 90 hours of funding.

Again, student behavioral changes may dampen the expected downward impact on cost.

(SEE CHART BELOW incorporating 2010 and 2011 law changes).

5. LIMIT RESTORATION TO ONE-TIME

Changes to the restoration policy first affect FY 2010-11 initial students.

According to OSFA, 5,385 students applied for restoration in FY 2010-11, with approximately 59.3% of that number restoring.

This number includes ALL Bright Future participants and represents less than 2% of all awards.

A downward impact on program cost is expected, but student behavioral changes could dampen the effect.

2011 Law Changes

1. FAFSA NOW REQUIRED (Chapter 2011-63, L.O.F., Section 16 amending s.1009.286, F.S.)

Students are now required to submit a complete, error-free FAFSA for Bright Futures, Florida Resident Access Grant, and Access to Better Learning and Education Grant initial and renewal eligibility any time prior to disbursement. No FAFSA = No \$

2. INCREASE IN COMMUNITY SERVICE REQUIREMENTS (Chapter 2011-63, L.O.F., Sections 18, 19 and 20 amending s.1009.534 through s.1009.536, F.S.)

Increase in community service requirement for all three Bright Futures award levels: Bright Futures Florida Academic Scholars (FAS), Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS), and Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV). During the 2011-12 academic year, and thereafter, the required community service hours to be completed for the following awards are:

FAS – 100 hours (increased from 75 hours)

FMS – 75 hours (increased from 0 hours)

GSV – 30 hours (increased from 0 hours)

The Florida Department of Education is required to approve home education community service hours for Bright Futures initial eligibility

3. INCREASE IN TEST SCORES (Chapter 2011-63, L.O.F., Section 16 amending s.1009.286, F.S.)

IF STUDENTS DO NOT obtain higher scores, eligible pool will shrink and cost will decrease.

Change in eligibility scores begins with FALL 2012 INITIALS (FY 12-13), and continues through the forecast period.

Students may elect to use the GSV route, which requires lower test scores, to obtain at least 90 hours of funding.

Again, student behavioral changes may dampen the expected downward impact on cost.

Principals include professional staff designated by the coordinator of the Office of Economic and Demographic Research, the Executive Office of the Governor, the Senate, and the House of Representatives. Responsibility for presiding over sessions of the conference rotates among the principals.

Duties include the development of the number of students qualified for designated state financial aid programs, the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant and Access to Better Learning and Education programs, and the appropriation required to fund the full award amounts for each program.

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program (Attachment B)

2011-12

- The 2011-12 appropriation is \$350,000,000 for 180,862 projected students from the March 2011 consensus of estimated eligible students.
 - The February 2012 projection reflects a total student count of 173,283.
 - The 2011-12 estimated end of year annual expenditures are \$335,893,928 which would leave an unexpended balance of \$14,106,072.
 - The 2011-12 Term 1 actual sector attendance percentages and enrolled hours were used to create the 2011-12 end of year projections. The percentage of attendance at 4 year institutions increased (FAS .5% and FMS 3.1%) which will increase expenditures.
 - It is expected that the state will expend \$5,444,541 in Term 2 (3.34% of all course hours) that will then be dropped or withdrawn by students and therefore returned to the state from the institutions as unexpended by June 30, 2012.
 - A 2010 law change allows for graduate degree funding for one term for those students who have completed their baccalaureate degree in 7 or fewer semesters. During Term 1, there were 586 students who met that requirement

and disbursed for one additional term with Bright Futures funding. This represents .34% of the projected disbursed students at the end of the first term.

2012-13

- The 2012-13 LBR was \$344,689,866 and 178,118 students.
- The February 2012 projection for 2012-13 results in a cost of \$326,328,069 (a decrease of \$18.4 M from the LBR) with a student count of **167,668**, which is recommended for consensus.

Assumptions for 2012-13 student counts:

- Initial students are 30% of the High School graduating class who become initially eligible and disburse, broken out into the relative FAS, FMS or GSV programs. For 2012-13, we decreased the FMS initials by 5% for those students who are projected not to meet the increased test score of 980 SAT or 21 ACT.
- The 2011-12 Term 1 actual sector attendance percentages and enrolled hours were used to create the 2012-13 projections, with the one exception in the FMS to accommodate the 5% reduction of initial students.
- Renewal students are based on their programs (FAS, FMS, GSV) prior year percentage of continuing students.

Assumptions for 2012-13 cost:

- Projections are based on the 2011-12 flat award per credit hour.
- The disbursements at 2 or 4 year institutions are based on the Term 1 2011-12 sector attendance percentages and enrolled hours.
- Approximately **\$5.4 million above the projected \$326.3 million** will be expended during the second half of the year for the course hours that students are projected to drop or withdraw, which would then be refunded to the state by the institutions by end of fiscal year.

William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant

(Attachment C)

2011-12

- The 2011-12 appropriation is \$80,761,255 for 40,991 students.
 - 35,529 students at \$2,149 per annual award for FRAG eligible institutions that participated prior to 2011-12
 - 5,462 students at \$803 per annual award for the newly eligible participating institution, Keiser University.
- The February 2012 projection for end of year full-time equivalent (FTE) students decreases by 4,132 students for a total of 36,859.
- We project to expend \$74,041,547, leaving a balance of \$6.7 million of program funds due to a decrease in full time enrollment at FRAG eligible institutions.

2012-13

- The 2012-13 LBR was \$80,761,255 for 40,991 FTE students.
 - 35,529 students at \$2,149 per annual award for FRAG eligible institutions that participated prior to 2011-12
 - 5,462 students at \$803 per annual award for any newly eligible participating institutions.

- The February 2012 projection for 2012-13 reflects a level FTE student count of **36,859**, which is recommended for consensus. The newly eligible institution as of 2011-12 is Keiser University. Their FTE student count represents 3,841 of the total which leaves an FTE count of 33,018 at previously eligible institutions.
- The projected cost, based on the full 2011-12 award of \$2,149 for students at all institutions, decreases to \$79,211,006.

Access to Better Learning and Education (Attachment D)

2011-12

- The 2011-12 appropriation is \$2,419,439 for 3,013 FTE students to each receive a maximum award of \$803.
- The February 2012 projection for end of year full-time equivalent (FTE) students decreases by 136 students for a total of 2,877.
- We project to expend \$2,310,157, leaving a balance of \$109,282 of program funds due to a decrease in full time enrollment at ABLE eligible institutions.

2012-13

- The 2012-13 LBR was \$2,419,439 for 3,013 FTE students at the 2011-12 maximum award of \$803.
- The February 2012 projection for 2012-13 reflects a level FTE student count of **2,877**, which is recommended for consensus.
- The projected cost, based on the 2011-12 award, decreases to \$2,310,157.

Florida Student Assistance Grants (Attachment E)

2011-12

- The 2011-12 appropriation is \$130,032,018 which includes Otherwise Eligible students (those who meet FSAG requirements but do not receive an award due to funding constraints). The amount of \$375,000 is reserved for the Children/Spouses of Deceased and Disabled Veterans program.
- The February 2012 projection for end of year students decreases to 109,545 with the total appropriation being expended.
- The 2011-12 projected combined average state award for the three degree seeking need grant programs (Public, Private, Postsecondary) is \$1,206, or 50% of the maximum award.
- The entire state appropriation is projected to be expended within all four grants; Public, Private, Postsecondary and Career Education.
- An additional \$5.6 million of federal matching funds will also be expended.

2012-13

- The 2012-13 LBR was \$130,032,018 to fund a projected 189,269 eligible students.
- The February 2012 projection for 2012-13 reflects a decrease from the LBR to **172,159**, which is recommended for consensus.
- The maximum award is set in the General Appropriations Act each year.

Children/Spouses of Deceased and Disabled Veterans (Attachment F)

2011-12

- The 2011-12 appropriation is \$2,442,776, projected to serve 899 students from the March 2011 estimated eligible students.
- The February 2012 projection for the end of year students decreases to 794. However, the projected average award increased from \$3,183 in 2010-11 to \$3,505 in 2011-12. Students are awarded the full amount of their tuition and all fees.
- We expect to expend \$2,783,232, which is the current year appropriation and a shortfall of \$340,456.
 - We have applied the proviso “guidelines” language in the 2011-12 Line Item 59 for Student Financial Aid to allocate the shortfall with appropriation dollars within the same budget entity.

2012-13

- The 2012-13 LBR was \$2,442,776 to fund 899 students.
- The February 2012 projection for 2012-13 students decreases to **802**, which is recommended for consensus.
- This projection is based on the prior year annual student growth rate.
- The February 2012 projected cost for 2012-13 is \$2,895,907 based on the current year average award plus a 3.0% increase in the CPI which equals \$3,610. This is \$453,131 more than the LBR.

Dear Chairman Shanahan,

Sections 1009.22(3)(d), 1009.23(3)(c), and 1009.24(4)(b), F.S., require the Office of Economic and Demographic Research to:

...report the rate of inflation to the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Governor, and the State Board of Education each year prior to March 1.

The calculated rate of inflation provides the default rate of increase for tuition and out-of-state fees, unless otherwise provided in the General Appropriations Act. This default rate applies to institutions within the State University System, the Florida College System and workforce education programs that are reported for funding. The rate of inflation is defined as:

...the rate of the 12-month percentage change in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, U.S. City Average, All Items, or successor reports as reported by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, or its successor for December of the previous year.

According to the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, in its release dated Friday, January 19, 2012, the December 2011 Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers was 225.672 (1982-84=100). The December 2011 index was 3.0 percent higher than the index for December 2010.

Consequently, the rate of inflation for FY 2012-13 budgeting purposes is 3.0 percent.

Projections for future years are attached. These projections are based on the National Economic Estimating Conference held on December 6, 2011.
