4-year old Prekindergarten Participation Rates in Selected States

The National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER), a unit of Rutgers University, has published annual state prekindergarten reports since the 2001-2002 program year. For the State of Preschool 2013 report, Washington DC's prekindergarten program was reclassified as one entity. NIEER originally regarded Washington DC's program as either charter or public because there were different restrictions and standards for each program, but now they are considered to be one entity since both programs must follow the same requirements for funding.

In Table 1, the nine states (and Washington DC) have the highest percent of 4-year-olds enrolled in state prekindergarten in 2012-2013. Nationwide, only Florida and West Virginia offered a 4-year old universal prekindergarten program as defined by eligibility for all 4-year olds, no funding cap, and 100 percent district participation. The funding cap is defined as whether or not the state has a waiting list for students seeking enrollment. Each state's prekindergarten program may differ in terms of options for three-year olds, enrollment criteria beyond age requirements, funding, academic standards, district participation, and operating schedules.

Participation rates represent the number of 4-year-old enrollments divided by the US Census Bureau population estimate of 4-year-olds. Rates were calculated by NIEER for the school years 2008-09 through 2012-13, while the 2013-14 participation rates were calculated by dividing the state reported enrollments of 4-year olds by the 2013 US Census estimates of 4-year olds. Florida's 2013-14 4-year old participation rate was taken from the July 2014 Voluntary Prekindergarten Estimating Conference. Enrollment numbers for the 2013-2014 school year were gathered from each state. *The State of Preschool 2014* will be published in April 2015.

Major findings from State of Preschool 2013 report include:

- 1. An unchanged nationwide participation rate of 28% for 4-year olds.
- 2. The first observed decrease in estimated enrollments of 9,160 4-year olds since reporting began in 2001-2002.
- 3. Washington DC served the greatest percentage of 4-year olds followed by Florida, Oklahoma, and Vermont in 2012-13.
- 4. South Carolina fell out of the top ten to the eleventh spot with the addition of Washington DC.
- 5. Between the 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 program years, lowa and Vermont had the greatest percentage increases in 4-year old participation rates (5 percentage points) by adding 3,045 and 249 students, respectively.
- Arkansas, California, Connecticut, Illinois, Pennsylvania, and South Carolina had the greatest percentage decreases in their 4-year old participation rates (1 percentage point) with California having the greatest reduction in students, 14,392 during this time period.
- 7. In comparing West Virginia and Florida (the only universal programs), both states decreased in enrollments from 2012-13 to 2013-14. Comparisons to larger states such as California, New York, and Texas are less appropriate because they do not have universal prekindergarten programs as defined above.
